The Portage-Crooked Lakes Improvement Association PUBLIC NOTICE

The Portage-Crooked Lakes Improvement Association (PCLIA) may contract to treat Eurasion Water Milfoil, an Aquatic Invasive Species in the Crooked, Sugar Bay, Hanks and Portage chain of lakes in 2024. This is dependent on an evaluation of the need.

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources has granted the PCLIA a waiver requiring that the association obtain the signatures for approval of lake-shore property owners. Instead, the PCLIA will notify property owners of the treatment through alternate forms. This newsletter notice is one form that the PLIA is using to notify property owners. Other forms include, but not limited to, notification through the association's web page, member newsletter and annual meeting.

The proposed dates for treatment is June 1, 2024 through October 31, 2024. Eurasion Water Milfoil is the target species for the treatment.

The method of control or product being used: EPA and MDA registered aquatic herbicides. Such as but not limited to Liquid 2,4-D, Granular 2,4-D, Granular Tri Clopyr, Florpyrauxifen-Benzyl.

Landowners may request that control not occur adjacent to the landowner's property. If you desire that the treatment of Eurasion Water Milfoil not occur adjacent to your property, please notify the Portage-Crooked Lakes Improvement Association immediately at the following address and email address below:


The Boats on the Water...What to Remember

Each year we anxiously wait for the ice to go out so we can, once again, get our boats back on the water. Here are three good things to check before you splash your boat this spring:

- License and registration. Because these are good for 3 years it's easy to forget to check if they have expired. They expire December 31st of the year shown on the sticker.
 License numbers and stickers have also been known to rub or peel off so it's a good time to check the conditions of those.
- Life jackets. Torn fabric or missing straps can hamper the function and even disqualify a jacket from the required counts set by the DNR. Spring is a great time to give them a quick check over.
- Finally, don't forget to check your fire extinguisher. Fire extinguishers typically have a gauge to show if they are full or need a recharge.

Let's All Pitch In To Experience Our Dark Skies

Having a place on the Crooked Lake chain means we've all had a chance to gaze up at the night sky to see the Milky Way stars through a canopy of pine trees or wonder at the sight of a bright full moon or even catch a glimpse of the Northern Lights. I often sit at the end of our dock at night hoping to see a shooting star or a satellite passing by.

But over the years I've noticed something slowly encroaching and starting to obscure these wonderful experiences: More and more light pollution. This light pollution isn't intentional or deliberate. None of us want to contribute to any kind of pollution; we're all environmentalists at heart or we wouldn't be here. It's simply a byproduct of our modern world that we all contribute to.

Let me give you some facts. Did you know that 80% of North Americans can't see the Milky Way or that the sky worldwide has brightened 9.6% over the last ten years? Light pollution hampers the mating of fireflies. An estimated 30% of outdoor lighting is wasted costing the U.S. over \$3 billion annually. You can see that we're not alone in the challenge to eliminate excess outdoor lighting; it's prevalent across all of Minnesota and beyond.

Many Minnesotans are starting to fight back to try to change this trend. The largest certified Dark Sky Reserve in the world is right here in Minnesota. Over the last few years, the BWCAW, Voyageurs National Park and The Quetico have teamed up to be certified by the International Dark Sky Association. Cook County hosts an annual dark sky festival. More and more lake associations like ours are starting to educate their members on the benefits of dark skies.

Our hope is that by bringing awareness to this issue we will make our members think about how they use artificial outdoor lighting for the benefit of themselves and our entire chain of lakes. Mindful approaches to lighting can and do make a huge difference.

I'll be providing some useful tips in our next newsletter but in the meantime let me give you some things to think about: If you have a yard light, does it need to be on all night? Do you really need your patio or front door light on when you're not using it? Can dock lighting be reduced by pointing them down or turning them off? Let's all start thinking about our dark skies and how we can pitch in to help keep them that way.

Natural Island Paradise

It's known as the Crooked Lake Island. A place where native plants thrive and wildlife flourishes. It's especially known for its large and abundant birch, oak, pine, and maple trees.

What makes this 2.6-acre island unique is that in the early 1900's when the entire Crooked Lake area and most of Northern Minnesota was extensively logged by lumber companies, somehow the Crooked Lake Island was missed and mostly forgotten by the lumber jacks with their axes and 2-man saws.

The earliest records of the island reveal that it initially belonged to the Chippewa Native Americans. Then according to the abstract in 1903 Liston B. Manley purchased the island from the Chippewa.

The Manleys and all subsequent owners decided to leave Crooked Lake Island in its natural state. No cabin was ever constructed on the island. No docks ever extended into the lake. Since 1903 the island was only used for occasional picnics and an impromptu swimming beach.

The current owners plan to honor the long legacy of habitat preservation established by all of the previous island owners. They're trying to keep the island in its natural state for future generations to explore and enjoy. They appreciate the respect shown by past island visitors for helping them to achieve their environmental goals.

The information for this article was taken from a 1975 Mankato State University thesis paper by Ralph E. Swantz.

Mr. Swantz, whose family still lives on the lake, realized almost half of a century ago that the habitat was being destroyed largely by commercialization and urbanization of land in Minnesota and wrote his thesis to study the effects.

This thesis paper, in turn, relied on the oral history of Crooked Lake provided by long term resident Albert Maghan who lived on the lake since 1904.

The PCLIA would like to remind island visitors to do your best to help keep the Crooked Lake Island a natural sanctuary. Remember, please, do not build fires or leave behind anything on the island.
